Remember You Are Dust

*"For you know well how we are formed;
you remember that we are but dust." — Psalm 103: 14*

"Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal;²⁰ but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal.²¹ For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." — Matthew 6: 19-21

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

It's all dust! I'm dust. My family and friends are dust. All of my possessions are dust. The earth itself is dust. How depressing! No wonder so many people want to avoid Ash Wednesday and the season of Lent altogether. "REMEMBER YOU ARE DUST, AND TO DUST YOU SHALL RETURN." Lent can be, as one of my friends says, "a total bummer, dude!" Yes, it can be a "bummer," especially if you've never been told or faced the truth before — everything dies, and you are going to die too. The truth can kill.

Dust and death is not the first or the last word, however. It is a reminder of where we are without God's promise and presence. It is a statement of the reality of the power of sin in our lives and all of creation, as Paul writes, "The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law" (1 Cor. 15: 56). We all suffer and struggle with the truth of dust and death.

"BUT," continues Paul, "thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Cor. 15: 57). We face one truth so that we can hold even more firmly onto the greater truth and hope. The greater truth that through Christ we are given victory over sin, death, and the power of the law that threatens to condemn us to an existence of hopelessness, meaninglessness, and despair. The greater truth will set you free and make you alive together with Christ!

Yes, we are dust, but we are dust that God made, dust that God formed, and dust that God breathed life into with the Spirit. We are creatures of dust and spirit, whom God so loved, that God's Son took on our dusty existence as the Incarnate One, becoming fully human — Jesus Christ. Jesus Christ who died and rose again so that we creatures of dust, made in the very image of God, would have

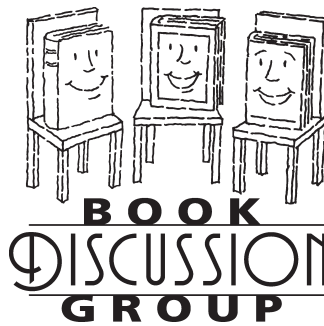

BABY OLIVIA NEEDS OUR HELP

Dear friends,

I am writing today regarding a topic I brought up last month as a prayer request. A family in our congregation is in great need to help their baby girl — the John & Tami Indrehus family and their baby Olivia who is suffering from a disorder which causes the head to be misshapen. John has four other children, including Olivia's twin brother, Roman with his wife, Tami. His three older children, Kayley, Taylor and Austen are very involved with confirmation and SWAT team and youth group.

Olivia will need one, maybe two, helmets to correct this problem. The helmets are incredibly expensive. Unfortunately, because John is in the military and on military medical insurance, the insurance will not cover the helmet(s). This is so frustrating to me because military personnel risk their lives all over the world for our safety and freedom, and yet their own children are not covered under the military insurance. The family is unable to pay for the helmet(s) on their own, so we have been talking about having a fundraiser.

I am writing to let you know of this need and am hoping that our congregation could rally around this family and help out in any way we can. If you can help with a donation for baby Olivia, please write a check to Christus Victor with the words "baby Olivia" in the memo line, or cash would be great, too. You can give the donations to me and I will route it through Deanna and on to the family. Per IRS guidelines, this donation would not be tax deductible.

Working Harder for Working Families

A scarcity of food is rarely the cause of hunger. There is more than enough food to feed everyone in the United States. The supermarket store shelves are stocked to the ceiling. But none of this matters if families have no money in their pockets. Poverty spoils every meal.

The lone homeless person may be the most conspicuous image of poverty in the national media. Less conspicuous, but a much larger group, are the families who cycle in and out of poverty. Families most at risk are those that are just a little better off than poor, surviving on low-wage jobs until suddenly they lose their financial footing because the main wage earner's job has been eliminated or one of the family members has a medical emergency.

We all agree, no hard working family should have to raise their children in poverty — and yet the sad truth is that many are. Two-thirds of all children growing up in poverty in the United States have one or more working parents, and many of these parents are working more than one job. Some families work jobs that don't give benefits; they are getting by until one of them gets sick or the car breaks down — then they have to make a choice: pay for medical care/repairs and go without enough food to feed their family or ask for help from the local food shelf.

Three decades ago, a low-wage job was enough to lift a family of three out of poverty; today, it scarcely comes close to getting them to the poverty line. Today, with increased fuel and food costs, and less home budget money to work with, life has become more difficult for millions of people struggling to feed their families. Food shelves all across Minnesota and at Minnesota FoodShare, those who are on the frontlines of the fight against hunger, they see the struggle up close.

- In 2008, 50 million pounds of food was distributed to Minnesota families
- A total of 992,750 Minnesotans live in households struggling to put food on the table
- The working poor in the Twin Cities suburbs make up 60 percent of the people who use food shelves
- Two-thirds of food shelf visitors make less than \$1,000 a month, not enough to cover a family's basic needs



In the United States?? Aren't we supposed to be the richest country in the world? If that many people were struggling to feed their families BEFORE this recession hit us, just imagine how many more are making those hard choices now.

Christus Victor's Social Ministries Committee is teaming up with Minnesota FoodShare in a March Food Drive. The March campaign is the largest food and fund drive for food shelves in the state. Minnesota FoodShare matches all donations made in the month of March, allowing your donations to grow and multiply. Minnesota FoodShare restocks more than 250 food shelves across the state each year.

It's easy to feel helpless when you watch people around the world suffering for lack of food. Together, we can turn a recipe for despair into a recipe for hope for families of Minnesota.

Recipe for Hope

- Bring your non-perishable food donations to the Grocery Cart located in the Narthex at Christus Victor March 1-March 29.
- Give monetary donations — Cash donations are easier to collect and deliver. Food shelves can stretch donations of cash further than donation of food because of their access to discount products and programs. Cash also gives the food shelf flexibility to acquire perishable items like fresh produce, meat and dairy products. Cash doesn't spoil or expire so it can be used throughout the year by food shelves as need fluctuates. A donation can and collection envelopes are available in the donation cart at CV.
- Pray for an end to hunger for families of Minnesota and all across the world.

A challenge has been issued by Pastor Laura to "do something crazy" and donate 4,000 items and she'll do something a little crazy when the results of March's food drive are revealed on April 19.

A duo-challenge has been offered by both Pastor Laura & Pastor Kent if the CV congregation can achieve a goal of 5,000 items.

The ultimate ingredient for hope ... is *you*.

There are two foundational elements necessary, yet often missed, to strengthen or create a successful youth ministry program. The first is a unified vision and plan for the youth ministry. The second element is committed volunteers to make that plan a reality! A surefire way to burn out a youth minister is to expect them to be all and do all. Successful ministries have a team of people committed to hands-on involvement.

Easy Ways to Build Assets for and with Your Child

FAST FACTS

ASSET #36: Peaceful Conflict Resolution

Youth are more likely to grow up healthy when they seek to resolve conflict nonviolently.

45%

of youth surveyed by Search Institute have this asset in their lives.*

What Are Assets?

Assets are 40 values, experiences, and qualities that help kids succeed. "Peaceful conflict resolution" is one of five social-competencies assets.

* Based on Search Institute surveys of 217,277 6th- to 12th-grade youth throughout the United States during the 1999-2000 school year.

7 Steps to Making Peace

"Children who learn how to think about their relationships with other people do better in life in general," says Myrna B. Shure, Ph.D., a developmental psychologist. Shure created the I Can Problem Solve (ICPS) program, which focuses on the thinking skills needed for young people to resolve conflicts peacefully.

Shure suggests that before young people begin discussing a specific conflict, they find out if the time and place are good for the discussion. If so, they can begin the seven-step process. If not, they should identify a time and place that work for everyone involved. Next:

- 1.** Identify the conflict. Have each person talk about what happened. Each person's account is equally important.
- 2.** Talk about the events that led to the conflict. What happened first? Second? What increased the conflict?
- 3.** Name how you feel. Ask others involved to identify how they feel. Encourage people to be honest about how they feel without blaming others.
- 4.** Listen carefully to each person's feelings and accounts of the conflict. Use empathy skills. Try to understand each person's point of view.
- 5.** Brainstorm solutions. Be creative. Affirm each person's ideas but keep encouraging people to think of different solutions.
- 6.** Evaluate each solution. Choose one solution that everyone agrees on.



- 7.** Monitor how the solution works. If something needs to change, start again.

"If children can learn to solve typical everyday problems, they are less likely to become impulsive, insensitive, withdrawn, aggressive, or antisocial," Shure says. "In the long run it is important for children to learn how to think about the problems they encounter in their dealings with other people."

Helpful Hints

Tips that make peaceful conflict resolution easier:

- **Have everyone involved honestly state their needs and wants without blaming others.**
- **Have everyone listen, listen, listen, and try to understand each other.**
- **Stay focused on the conflict at hand; do not bring up other conflicts.**
- **Emphasize creative problem solving and creating new solutions.**
- **Negotiate until a win-win result is found.**

Three ways to improve peaceful conflict resolution with your child:

- 1 Set up a specific place in your home for peacemaking. For example, you might identify a certain room for family members to resolve conflicts. In this room, you might require that people use respectful words and take turns talking and listening.
- 2 When conflicts occur at home, use author William Kreidler's approach: **CAPS**. **C**ool off. **A**gree to work it out. **P**oint out your view. **S**olve the problem.
- 3 Admit when you've responded poorly to conflict. Apologize. Suggest new ways to solve the conflict.

Quick Tip:
Don't avoid conflict, but resolve it peacefully.
